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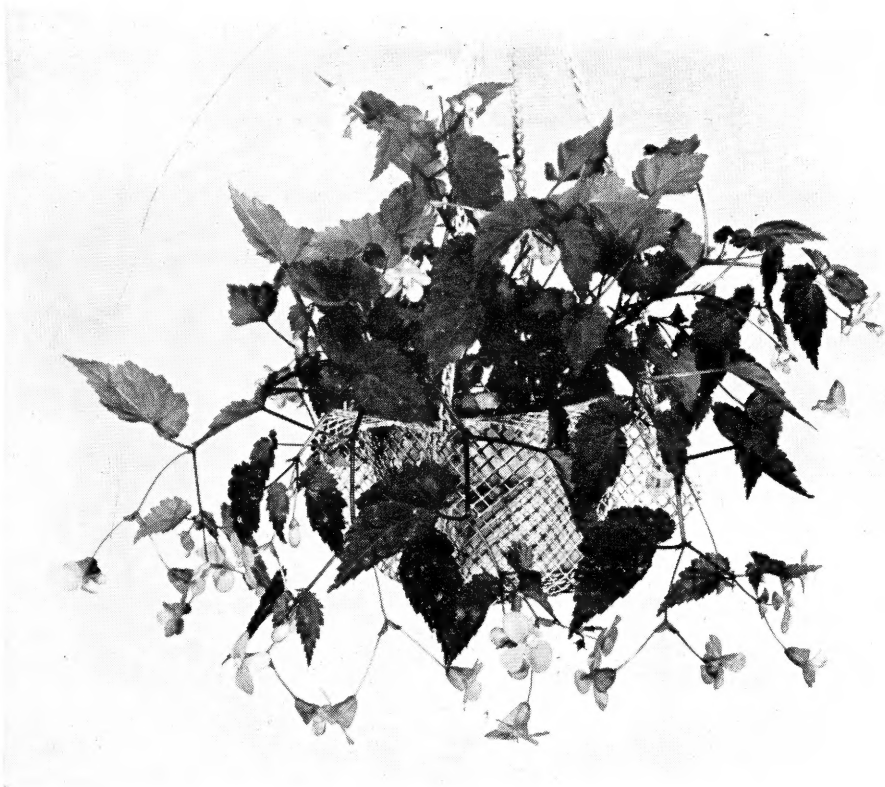

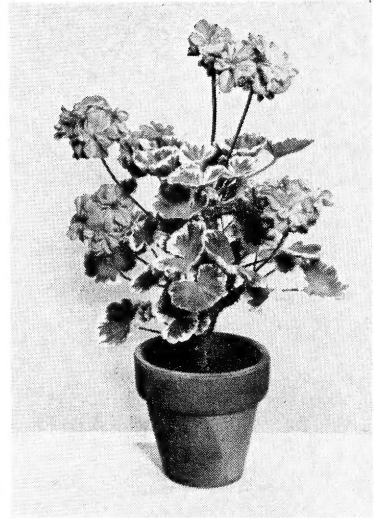

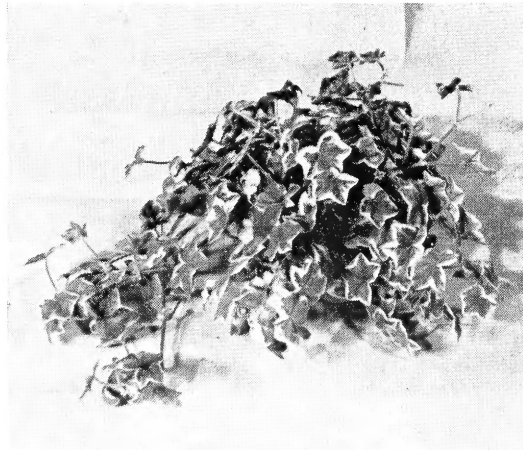

- P. Graveolens (Rose Scented Group)**—Deeply cut foliage. Lavender pink blooms.  
**Rose**—The old fashioned sweet-scented variety used in cookery.  
**Rober's Lemon Rose**—Stronger rose scent than above.  
**Grey Lady Plymouth**—Grey-green and white leaf.  
**Variegated Mint scented Rose**—Beautiful green and white leaf.
- P. Cordiatum Cuculatum Group**—Leaves medium, round and lobed.  
**Snowflake**—Rose scent. Leaf splashed white. Lavender blooms.  
**Clorinda**—Mild scent. Large pink blooms like a Martha Washington.
- P. Radula Group**—The skeleton leaf type. Deeply cut coarse leaves.  
**Radula (Crowfoot)**—Free blooming showy, small pink. Mild scent.  
**Dr. Livingston (Skeleton Leaf)**—Lemon scent. Lavender-pink blooms.  
**Blandfordianum**—Grey leaf. Musk scent. White blooms.
- P. Denticulatum Group**—Deeply cut leaves. Pine scent.  
**Filicifolium (Fernleaf)**—Blooms small pink. Finely cut leaf.  
**Apricot**—Showy bright pink blooms. Strong scent.  
**Jatrophaefolium (True Pheasant's Foot)**—Wiry growth. Small leaf.  
**Pheasant's Foot**—Cut toothed-edge leaf. Blooms pink.
- P. Quercifolium Group**—Oak leaf types. Pungent scent. Showy pink bloom:  
**Fair Ellen**—Medium leaved with dark zone. Blooms freely.  
**Giant Oak**—Leaf extra large and handsome.  
**Little Gem**—Low, bushy, small cut leaves. Blooms freely.  
**Staghorn Oak**—Deeply lobed pretty leaf. Abundant blooms.  
**Village Hill Oak**—Deeply lobed and toothed. Free blooming.
- P. Crispum Group**—Lemon scented. Small leaves, bushy. Small blooms.  
**Gooseberry**—Fruit scent. Leaves mottled yellow. Blooms lavender.  
**Lady Mary**—Fruit scent. Showy pink blooms continuously. One of best.  
**Limoneum**—True lemon scent. Showy carmine flowers.  
**Lemon Crispum**—Smallest leaved. Strong lemon scent. Blooms lavender.  
**Orange**—Strong orange scent. Showy pink and white blooms. Nice.  
**Strawberry**—Real strawberry scent. Dark pink blooms. Nice.  
**Prince Rupert Lemon**—Fingerbowl type. Good lemon scent.  
**Prince Rupert variegated Lemon**—A choice green and white form.
- P. Odoratissimum Group**—Low, often trailing small strong scented leaves.  
**Apple**—Ruffled round strong apple scented leaves. Trailing. White blooms.  
**Cocoonut**—Trailing. Glossy dark strong scented leaves. Tiny red blooms.  
**Nutmeg**—Silver-grey ruffled, lobed leaf. Nice scent.  
**Old Spice (Logeei)**—Apple-Nutmeg cross.
- P. Tomentosum Group**—Peppermint scented leaves, large and tomentose.  
**Joy Lucile**—Velvety deeply lobed leaf. Lavender pink blooms.  
**Peppermint**—Beautiful velvet green leaf. Strong scent. White blooms.  
**Pungent Peppermint**—Deeply cut velvet grey leaf. Blooms white.
- P. Fulgidum Group**—Showy blooms in bright colors. Leaf and scent varies.  
**Brilliant**—Medium, round, toothed leaves. Showy bright red blooms.  
**Ginger**—Small, round, toothed leaf. Sweet scent. Showy lavender blooms.  
**Lime**—As above. Leaf slightly smaller and ruffled.  
**Mrs. Kingsley**—Leaf round, curled. Blooms beautiful crimson.  
**Mrs. Taylor**—Scarlet free blooming.  
**Rollinson's Unique**—Similar to Mrs. Kingsley. Leaf ruffled not as curled. Mild scent.  
**Scarlet Unique**—Ruffled cut, grayish leaf. Blooms scarlet, black blotch.

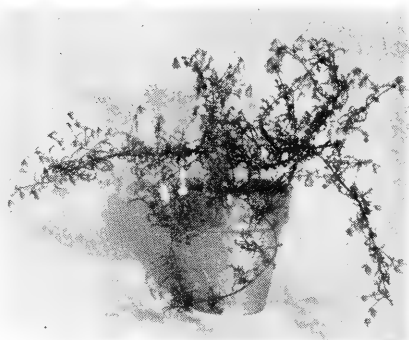

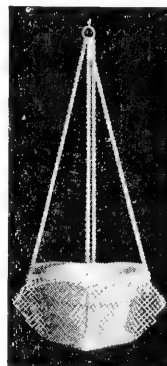
